

Post It Notes from Pastor Luehr



November will bring in Thanksgiving and will officially start the season known as "The Holidays." That will likely either bring feelings of good cheer and merriment or feelings of dread on all the things we need to get done. Another common feeling during "The Holidays" is sadness and loss over those who are no longer with us on this earth. I think it is even more appropriate that November starts with All Saints Sunday. On Sunday, November 4, we celebrate All Saint's Sunday when we remember all the saints from our congregation who have died in the past year. We read their names and ring a bell for their memory recognizing that they are now living in the company of the angels and in the full sainthood of being in God's presence.

I am especially thinking about it now as we have said goodbye to a number of longtime members this year. The recent deaths in our congregation were remembered in a celebration of life that included music, memories, scripture and stories of those who are now living with the Lord. In some cases, the one who's life we were celebrating had told their family and loved ones what they would like at their funeral.

This made me realize that it is time again to look at end-of-life planning. We had a seminar a number of years ago where we talked very openly about death and dying and gave people a chance to think about how they would like to be remembered at the end of their life. I know for many people this can be a difficult thing to think about, however as one who has helped many families plan funerals, I have seen what a comfort it can be to know what their loved one would like at their memorial service.

We are having an End-of-Life Planning Seminar on Sunday, November 4 (All Saint's Sunday) from 3:00-4:00 PM in the Moerer Hall Fireside Room just before the Annual Congregational Meeting. This is something that people of all ages are welcome and encouraged to attend. Thinking about and planning for the end of your earthly life does not mean it is imminent nor does it have to be a morose or taboo topic. I pray that if nothing else, this meeting would open you up to talking about and normalizing the part in our journey from this Earthly Kingdom into our Heavenly Kingdom.

□ Celebrate good times, c'mon! □

I will not try to shy away from it, November is my birthday month. And since I am already keyed into celebrations, I thought we could look through November and note November's other monumental events. Looking through the lens of the Reformation that birthed our faith tradition, realizing that as important as reforming our church was 501 years ago, it still is today. We recognize God is still at work in our midst.



- The first day of November and the first Sunday is celebrated as All Saints Day, a day when we remember all those saints who have gone before us. It can also be a reminder of all the other deaths in our lives: a failed test, losing independence, job loss, difficulties in marriage, or a betrayal of a friend. We believe in death AND resurrection. Allow this All Saints Day to help you experience only God's transformation that is possible through death and resurrection.
- Early November 1970, the governing bodies which preceded the now ELCA voted to ordain women into the ministry of Word and Sacrament! This made my call to ordained ministry possible and made it possible for many others like me. One thing I have heard while on internship and that is extremely exciting to hear is something to the effect of "Wow, it is so powerful to see two women clergy in front on Sunday morning." But as I reflect on women's ordination, I cannot forget the lay women and men who made it possible. You made it possible 48 years ago and are still making it possible today in your support of women and girls around the globe to follow God's call for them.
- November 13, 1956, Racial Segregation on buses was voted unconstitutional. At Luther Seminary we have a student group called DR:BC (Dismantling Racism: Living into Beloved Community). The group invites conversation regarding the ongoing reality of racism in the church, in this country, and globally. This is a reminder of Jesus' call to each of us, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is like this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." (Mk 12:30-31)
- 229 years ago, on November 26, 1789 President George Washington declared the first American Holiday: Thanksgiving. Join me in giving thanks to God for everything, down to our most recent breath. Everyday, each moment is a gift from the maker of all. Praise be to God.
- November 25th marks Christ the King Sunday, a day that asks of us, "In whom do you place the
 full measure of your trust?" In his explanation of the 1st commandment in the Large Catechism
 Martin Luther suggests, "A 'god' is a term for that to which we are to look for all good and in
 which we are to find refuge in all need. Therefore to have a god is nothing else than to trust and
 believe in that one with your whole heart... Anything on which your heart relies and depends, I
 say, that is really your God."

COMMUNITY SHARING AND CARING OUTREACH:

EYEGLASSES & CASES:

Many pairs of glasses and cases were donated to this ministry. They were taken to the Lion's Club where they will be assessed and repaired to provide the gift of sight to people around the world. Thanks to Cindy Reyes for leading this ministry.

PATRIOTS & PAWS:

Thanksgiving is coming and that means we have the opportunity to provide bags/baskets to our veterans through Patriots & Paws. Last year we provided 47 complete dinner bags, the second largest donation to them from a group. We have been challenged to exceed that number in 2018. These bags enables over 300 of our veterans and their families to prepare and have a Thanksgiving meal which they might not otherwise be able to afford. It is a wonderful way for us to be able to thank them for their service on our behalf.

HOLIDAY DINNER BAG

Each bag will need to be filled with the list of items noted below. We have more of our blue shopping bags available to use and they will be in Moerer Hall.

The filled bags need to be returned to EMANUEL no later than Sunday, November 4.

Holiday Dinner List

- One Grocery gift card to any major grocery store (minimum of \$20.00)
- One Box/Container of Stuffing Mix
- Two Packets of Dry Gravy or Two Cans of Turkey Gravy
- One Box/Bag of Instant Mashed Potatoes

- Two Cans Green Beans
- One Large Can of Yams
- Two Cans of Chicken Broth
- One Can of Cranberry Sauce

You can also add additional items if you wish.

Please provide a card with a note from you for the family that will receive your bag.

MATTHEW 25 GRANT: We are collaborating with the La Habra Family Resource Center in making the best use of this grant to PREVENT older women from becoming homeless. Often someone may be managing from month-to-month, but an unexpected expense, such as a car repair or a medical bill, can make them unable to pay their housing costs. This will allow emergency grants for them to retain their home and not fall into the loss spiral. A total of \$965.84 was sent to the center and will be used specifically to prevent older women from becoming homeless. As the grant is dispensed, we will be notified how the money was used and how it has been leveraged.

<u>FRISTERS</u>: Now that school is back in session, FRISTERS will begin meeting weekly. FRISTERS is a Christian-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that is dedicated to breaking the cycle of poverty and abuse within the teen parent population by providing education, access to resources, role models and support to teen mothers and their children. Fristers currently serves 700 mothers and children annually through six chapter locations throughout Orange County. Emanuel has supported this ministry for several years through the donation of children's books, diapers and wipes, and gifts for the children at Christmas. The current book title will be announced soon. At this time, due to very generous donations this past year, we have a large balance toward the costs of these books. If you would like to make a donation for books, that is wonderful. Otherwise, if you would like to share your gift with another ministry at this time, that would be also be much-appreciated.

<u>ANGEL TREE:</u> Christmas is right around the corner and with that our opportunity to provide special gifts for those who may not have a celebration without us. In recent years, we have provided gifts for family members through WINGS and for the children of Fristers. Watch for information in the bulletin very soon!

EVANGELISM:

Did you know that we have business cards with a picture of our stained glass window, our service times, and Pastor Cate's name on it? They are quite beautiful. Take a couple and keep them in your wallet. You never know when you might have the opportunity to share the GOOD NEWS which we proclaim at Emanuel.

Be sure and pick up your copy of the Annual Report. They are available in the Narthex or you can pick one up in the Church Office.



Kids korner




Enjoy searching for seasonal aspects of God's creation!
