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





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Post It Notes from Pastor Luehr

100 Days

At the time of writing this, it's been 100 days since the day things started to "unravel." It was 100 days ago that Vicar Matt and I decided we needed to cancel the live Lenten dinner and experiential worship that the week before had brought 50 people from all ages and walks of life together for laughter, learning, music and food. That night, March 12, with my husband Clay as technical support and Jeff Ward for music and theological banter, we held our first Facebook livestream Lenten series. *"But surely this will blow over soon."* I thought, *"This is just a precaution for tonight."* It didn't and it wasn't.

It has now been 100 days since "things were normal," and we can't predict or understand when "things will go back." Will it be another 100? Will it be more? The church council met earlier this week and looked at the questions we then posed to you, the congregation, about what our ministry would look like in the future. While we all want things to "go back to normal," and many just want to "return to worship like we always have," we know that that is just not a possibility for now.

During one of our council meetings a member asked a question that really got us thinking in a new way. It wasn't the nitty gritty about how and when to resume in person gatherings, how do we effectively clean our surfaces and protect our members, though all of those are important questions that need to be asked and addressed. She asked, "I wonder where God is leading us during this time? God led the Israelites in their wilderness for 40 years—we have only been in our wilderness for a few months. So I wonder what God has in store for us as we continue our journey."

That was a difficult but insightful thing to think about. God's people have been here before. They have been tested, they have been wondering, they have been renewed in their identity as God's beloved people. For the past 100 days, we have been anxious to get back to our old lives. Perhaps in the next 100 days we, as God's people, as Emanuel, can ask, "As we walk through this wilderness, where is God leading us next?"

THE EIGHTH COMMANDMENT

You are not to bear false witness against your neighbor. What is this?

Answer: We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light.

Vicar Matt, what is this and why do you have this in your article? I wonder if you have had the opportunity to read Luther's Small Catechism? For some of us this may have been part of our confirmation class, but it is not something incorporated too often after that. This summer I am taking a class called "Lutheran Confessions." For a lot of us when we hear the word confession, we may think of confessing something that we may have done wrong. In this context, it is talking about beliefs that are held. Luther's Small Catechism is meant to be used in the household and as an instructional book for parents to teach their children.

During class we read the Small Catechism and this is Luther's explanation of the 8th commandment. I personally really enjoy how Luther takes the commandments and puts them into daily life. Can you imagine what our world would look like if we followed Luther's explanation of the 8th commandment?!?! Could you imagine what social media might look like?!?!

I will be doing a sermon series this summer going through parts of the Small Catechism. As I told our church council, the Small Catechism may not be something to get super excited about at first, but I am excited to utilize it! Although the Small Catechism was written in 1529, it is still pertinent to our lives and I believe that it can help expand our understanding of our faith and deepen our understanding of our calling from God. I am looking forward to journeying with you through the Small Catechism this summer!

TAKE IT TO THE LORD IN PRAYER



glass • Water • Index card What you do: 1. Practicing over a sink, fill the glass halfway
 with water. Then press the index card snugly atop the glass with one hand. With the other hand, hold the base of the glass and carefully flip it over. Remove your hand from
 the card. It should stay on the glass, without spilling the water! The invisible air in the glass creates a suction with the card, preventing the water from spilling out.
