Post It Notes from Pastor Luehr

I normally love the season of Lent, but this year is going to be a little harder than normal. I normally love the season of Lent for a few reasons. First, we get a chance to hold extra midweek worship services where, as a preacher and worship leader, we get to think outside the box and explore a little. These worship services also serve as an extra pausing point in our otherwise busy weeks for myself and the people of Emanuel. It's a time to stop, refocus on what God is up to, and prepare ourselves for the ministry and life ahead of us. And most years it included a meal together!

The other reason I usually love Lent is that it can serve as a time of deep reflection and introspection. Specifically, it can be a time to look at our mortality and ask the tough questions of life. Honestly, under normal circumstances, we don't look at those things very much. But as Vicar Matt Polsdofer mentioned in his Ash Wednesday sermon, this past year has been one where we have all been astutely aware of our mortality. So, after a year of nearly 500,000 COVID-19 related deaths in our country alone, do we really need a liturgical season that reminds us that we are dust and to dust we shall return?

Also, we are not able to gather in person for midweek worship this year. I am excited about the collaboration we are doing for online Lenten worship with several of our ELCA sister congregations. At the same time, I am missing the meal we had a little over a year ago when fifty people of all ages gathered in Moerer Hall for sandwiches, song and stimulating conversation. So, at a time when the hustle and bustle of "normal life" seems distant, what is there really to take a break from?

I realized Lent has a different feel this year, a different purpose. It's a purpose that has always been there but is perhaps more pronounced this year. Lent 2021 is the season that propels us forward in Hope. This Lent, for me, is not about pausing and reflecting and ceasing from busy schedules. This Lent, for me, is not about reflecting on the brevity of our earthly lives in the scope of our promised eternal life. This Lent is about walking through the darkness, walking toward the cross, moving forward because we are propelled by the hope of the empty tomb on the other side of this long and dark Lenten journey. So that is what I will hold on to this Lent, and what I pray you are able to focus on too. Perhaps this is not the year to spend time in deep contemplation about the sins in our lives, but perhaps this year we acknowledge the hurt and darkness around us—and then fix our eyes on the light of Christ, our Risen Lord.

"Zacchaeus was a wee little man and a wee little man was he."

When thinking of Zacchaeus, the first thing that always comes to my mind is this song that I learned when I was a child. It is a song that plays in my mind anytime I hear about Zacchaeus. In this past January term, I was in a course called "Gospel According to Luke." The story of Zacchaeus is only found in the Gospel of Luke in chapter 19. For an assignment, I had to research and write a paper about Zacchaeus, which at first glance feels like an obvious and easy paper to write about because it is such a familiar text! However, diving into the text there was a lot that I learned and that stood out to me. For those familiar with the story the ending is that Zacchaeus is changed from a wicked tax collector and he is able to see where he has wronged people. He declares that he will give half of his possessions to the poor and pay back anyone he cheated FOUR TIMES the amount. Jesus then declares that, "Today, salvation has come to this house."

Have you ever wondered what made Zacchaeus change his mind and his way of life? When I read this story, I was wondering what great motivational speech Jesus gave to get Zacchaeus to change. All Jesus does is see Zacchaeus up in a tree and then Jesus invites himself over to Zacchaeus' house. This is not really a life changing speech to me. However, in reading and learning I now understand why this was so important. For some reason Zacchaeus is eager to see Jesus and I am assuming he is finding something lacking in his life. He is so eager to see Jesus that he climbs a sycamore tree. A sycamore tree that has low branches because he is short so he can climb up and see Jesus. By doing this Zacchaeus would have totally HUMILATED himself by climbing this tree. Yet, Zacchaeus climbs the tree and is seen by Jesus. The articles I read talked about that what was so life-giving and changing for Zacchaeus is that Jesus SEES him and this allows Zacchaeus to reflect on who he really has been. He sees that he has cheated many people and changes his ways. Jesus allows Zacchaeus to be seen and then allows a space for Zacchaeus to see who he really is. When we see others and others see us, we are able to reflect on who we really are and who we are made to be. Zacchaeus changes his ways because he is also able to see who he is made to be. I hope that we, as a community, can allow each other to see who we are made to be and share this gift with the world.

Thank you for having your kids join us for our online Sunday School lessons each week. This past month we have learned so much about Jesus.

IN-PERSON WORSHIP RESUMES SUNDAY, MARCH 7

The church council met on Tuesday, February 16 and determined it to be reasonably safe for Emanuel to resume outdoor parking lot worship on Sunday, March 7 at 10:00 AM. We will follow the previous format with people seated outdoors in chairs for a short in-person service of prayer, music, scripture, and homily. We will be practicing the usual safety protocols and are asking attendees to park in the lower lot by the classrooms and then walk to the registration table on the patio to check in. Then please continue to the upper parking lot where an usher will direct you and assist with a chair if needed. You are encouraged to bring your own chair or you may use one of the folding chairs from the church. If you would like to attend but wish to stay in your car, drive into the upper lot and an usher will direct you to a space designated for cars. Also, if you would like to sit in a chair but walking from the lower lot is a challenge, there will be limited parking in the upper lot available.

While we know this is still not "back to normal" we hope having a short time of worshipping together again will strengthen you for the days ahead.
